A QUICK ROAD TRIP GUIDE

Sydney --> Dubbo --> Broken Hill

A road trip is the perfect way to enjoy all the things to do and see in the wonderfully diverse states of NSW and SA, from beautiful beaches and spectacular national parks to historic towns, delicious wine regions, dazzling snowfields and the incredible outback. Discover food and wine trails, coastal drives, nature tours, outback adventures and much more.

A few important things you should know before taking off on the Sydney to Broken Hill drive:

- This road trip is best done outside of summer due to the extreme heat the region experiences during this time of year. Aim to travel between April and early November for maximum enjoyment.
- Allow a full week to drive from Sydney to Broken Hill in order to enjoy all of the stops along the way. Then you can drive straight back from Broken Hill to Sydney in 1-2 days either back the way you came, or south via Mildura and Wagga Wagga.
- There isn't much mobile coverage from Dubbo to Broken Hill unless you have Telstra.

Day 1: Sydney to Dubbo

Destination Dubbo

Considered the gateway to Outback NSW, Dubbo makes for a natural stop on the long drive to Broken Hill. It's 'only'

a 5 hour drive from Sydney, so you'd be totally fine with a late start on the first day and just crashing for the night in Dubbo before really getting into the Outback.

But if you have the time, why not spend a half day exploring Dubbo?

- Wander around the Dubbo Regional Botanic Gardens

Day 2: Dubbo to Cobar to Wilcannia

Destination Cobar

It's a 5-6 hour drive from Dubbo to Wilcannia, with Cobar fitting into the itinerary nicely as a stop at the approximate halfway point.

Cobar has been a copper mining town since its discovery in 1870. It's worth a quick stop to check out the mines and learn a bit about Cobar's mining history.

If you're itching to stop for food or fuel between Cobar and Wilcannia, the Emmdale Roadhouse will sort you out. Definitely stop for a break and to feed the resident roos out the back!

Accommodation

Stay overnight at the Copper City Motel 40 Lewis Street, Cobar

The Copper City Hotel and Motel is located in Cobar, NSW and is a great choice for travellers who appreciate quality accommodation in the rugged beauty of the outback.

The Motel has 32 rooms from budget to deluxe, each fitted with en-suites, flat screen TV's and reverse cycleair-conditioning. It also offers excellent facilities such as the swimming pool and on-site hotel.

The Copper City Hotel Motel is ideal for those travelling through Cobar with it's great facilities, accommodation types t suit all budgets and its central location – a two minute walk into town.

Caravan stop over at the Cobar Caravan Park

If you're bringing your van or tent, Cobar Caravan Park sites are pet-friendly so your best canine mate can stay too. We offer more than 100 powered sites, each surrounded by green grass, with plenty of space for you and your canine traveling companion. There are also on-site cabins (sorry, no pets in cabins) that are ideal for those travelling on business, an overnight stay, or for families undertaking an outback adventure. Under the management of Dineen Tourism Management since November 2011, Cobar Caravan Park has been transformed with a new reception, a landscaping program that included planting over 250 native plants, refurbishment of the amenities block, and the addition of twenty-six more powered sites. Things to do in Cobar:

- Drive up to Fort Bourke Lookout and gaze out at the New Cobar Open Cut Gold Mine. It's actually cooler than it sounds and well worth a look!
- Peruse the rural museum at the Great Cobar Heritage Centre, which provides a hands-on experience of the town's history.
- Amble through the Cobar Heritage Walk, which takes you past most of the places of interest in town.
- Walk along the Main Street and check out the old-timey buildings. The Great Western Hotel stands out the most with its 100-metre-long cast iron veranda (the longest in the country apparently!).
- Take a 33km detour on your way to Wilcannia to check out the Aboriginal rock art at Mount Grenfell. It's said to have some of the best rock art in all of Australia. (Note: Allow about a half day for this detour)



Day 2: Dubbo to Cobar to Wilcannia

Destination Wilcannia

In contrast to Cobar's copper, Wilcannia is (or used to be) all about wool. This historic port town sits on the Darling River and at one point was the third-largest port in Australia. More than that, it's been inhabited by the Barkindji people for over 40,000 years, so there's also some Aboriginal influence.

These days, Wilcannia has more of a sleepy town feel to it. It's an ideal place to slow down and relax before carrying on with the rest of your Outback NSW road trip.

Accommodation

Warrawong on the Darling Barrier Highway, Wilcannia 2836

Located on the banks of the Darling River, just off the Barrier Highway and 3km east of the Wilcannia township, Warrawong on the Darling offers the accommodation you need! All new, modern Cabins, Caravan and Bush Camping along the billabong.

The high-spec amenities block, beautiful scenery including lush grassy sites along the natural lagoon and river, provide caravaners and campers the comfort they long for – great for a night stopover or longer.

Things to do in Wilcannia:

- Walk around town and admire the old building facades (great for photo shoots!).
- Stay and relax at Warrawong on the Darling. Lounging on the veranda with a cold beverage in hand is a must or go for a drive or walk on the property's scenic dirt trails.
- Grab dinner at the Green Dragon Restaurant, tucked in the back corner of the Wilcannia Golf Club. There aren't many dining options in town, but this place does really good Asian fusion and is quite popular amongst the locals!
- Sit down with some coffee and cake in one of the local cafes.



Day 3: Wilcannia to White Cliffs

Destination White Cliffs

It's only about an hour's drive from Wilcannia to White Cliffs, which is actually off the Barrier Highway. Whatever you do, do NOT miss this detour on your NSW Outback road trip! It's the highlight. What's so special about White Cliffs you ask? Simply put, it's unlike anywhere else you've ever been.

White Cliffs is an opal mining town where people live mostly underground to avoid the hot summer temperatures. In that sense, it's similar to Coober Pedy – but unlike its big brother in South Australia, White Cliffs is a bit more off the beaten track and significantly less touristy. In fact, you may have the whole town to yourself if you intend visiting out of tourist season.


Accommodation

Underground Motel White Cliffs 129 Smiths Hill, White Cliffs

The White Cliffs Underground Motel is a huge underground complex, with 30 underground rooms and 2 above ground rooms. It has been open as a Motel for over 20 years, welcoming guests from all over the world for an experience that is absolutely unique.

The motel boasts a tranquillity that ensures a relaxed and peaceful stay. Once you venture underground, the distractions of modern life are let behind; there is no radio or mobile phone coverage, no fridge, TV or bathroom noise. Generally, facilities and amenities are located along the edge of the complex, supporting both the peace of underground living and the stability of the soil structure.





Gallery, Bar & Coffee

- Tour and stay at the Underground Motel. The rooms feel like little caves – it's the coolest thing! Plus, how fun would it be to sleep underground for a night? (Note: this hotel is closed from early December through mid-March).
- Visit the White House (aka Cree's House) to see a creative take on designing and furnishing an underground home. This is an absolute must-do in White Cliffs!
- Peruse the Outback Treasures outdoor 'museum', which is essentially a fenced-in area in someone's backyard full of rusty... 'treasures'.
- Have a look at the Stubbie House – yes, a house made of glass bottle-bottoms.
- Take a mine tour to learn about the local mining history, see some live demos of the mining equipment, and dig for opals yourself.
- Enjoy a cool drink at the underground bar Pub where you will meet some interesting local characters.

Destination Broken Hill

The drive from White Cliffs to Broken Hill takes about 3 hours. There's not much in-between the two, save for a roadhouse in Little Topar – ideal for fueling up if you're low on petrol or blood sugar. If you're lucky, you might get to share your ice cream with a visiting sheep!






Broken Hill is a fascinating city

In 2015 Broken Hill became the very first city in Australia to have the honour of being added to the National Heritage List.

Ready to hit the ground running? Good, because there's no shortage of things to see and do in and around Broken Hill.



Apart from wandering around the town centre, you might also enjoy filling your day with the following:

- Pop into the iconic Palace Hotel and ogle all the murals that cover nearly every inch of wall space. This is where Priscilla, Queen of the Desert was filmed.
- Visit the Living Desert and Sculpture Symposium about 15 minutes outside of Broken Hill. Aim to visit around sunset if you can and you'll have a prime view of the sun going down over the Outback.
- Drive 30 minutes out to the tiny town of Silverton, where Mad Max 2 was filmed. Silverton feels not unlike a ghost town, or something from the Wild Wild West.
- Take in the panoramic views from the Mundi Mundi lookout.
- Book onto a Sky Show at the Outback Astronomy and learn about the stars and constellations visible in the night sky here.



Things to Do In Wilcannia

Queens Head Hotel

WILCANNIA

The Queens Head Hotel has a great atmosphere, and an extraordinary backstory. Opened in 2017, the 140-year old building is a pub-turned-gallery, which owner Andrew Stacey envisions as providing an inspiration for Indigenous youth and a meeting place for the community – from a "public house of drinking... to a public house of healing". The artworks you'll find here are from established and new artists alike, and from young to old, and the facility itself reflects the important role that art plays in bringing community members together, and the role that the process of artmaking plays in sharing stories and enhancing wellbeing.

River Walks

Picturesque Wilcannia offers many beautiful walking and jogging tracks with some great photo opportunities. The river can be viewed from Baker Park, in Reid Street, and if you stand in the right spot, a few feet from the foot of the yellow stairs looking downstream, you can get a photo of the old bridge without the new one being visible. Steamers Point, on traditional Barkindji land, is on the right had side of the Tilpa road adjacent to the Golf Course, and again offers some great photo and bird watching opportunities.

Ivanhoe is a very small township on the Cobb Highway between the Lachlan and Darling rivers in New South Wales, Australia. It is located within the Central Darling Shire local government area. Ivanhoe functions as a service centre for the surrounding area. A township characterised by a particularly wide main street, Ivanhoe has a population of 180 people.

The Ivanhoe Heritage Trail provides a good introduction to the town and its history. At separate sign-posted locations along the trail there are detailed descriptions of (1) The Arrival of the Railway (2) The Government Tank (3) the Post Office (4) Bushrangers (5) Watering Holes (6) Industrial Trouble (7) The Cobb Highway and (8) Reminiscences. With the exception of the railway station all sites are located within a block of the main street. A pamphlet with details of the heritage trail is available from the post office and other retail outlets.

NATIONAL PARKS

For a truly special outback adventure, there's nothing like the National Parks of Far West NSW. From camping on the Darling River, to spotting abundant birdlife, spectacular stargazing opportunities or learning about the incredible history of the region you'll find adventures to remember forever.

Kinchega National Park

This fertile Outback oasis is part of the Menindee Lakes water system. Attracting flora and fauna galore its land and waterscapes are both incredibly photogenic. Tri State Safaris visits Kinchega National Park on tours, sharing insight into its fascinating Indigenous and pastoral history.

Paroo-Darling National Park

This National Park is known for over 40 species of waterbirds frequenting Peery Lake. If you visit in Spring, you may see baby emu chicks and it's also popular hangout for several species of kangaroos as well!

Mutawintji National Park

Mutawintji (pronounced moot-a-wint-ji) National Park was once a busy meeting place for Australia's ancient Indigenous inhabitants. Their dreamtime stories, history and teachings adorn rocks and caverns as stencils and engravings, providing a unique insight into the life and culture of the Australian Aboriginal people.

Things on offer:

- Interpretive walks to the Aboriginal rock engravings and hand stencil sites within Mutawintji's restricted access Historic Site

The Outback ha been renowned as the muse of Australian artists for many generations, with famous artists such as the Brushmen of the Bush depicting a rugged land of adventure and otherworldly beauty in all its glory. Outback NSW is home to a thriving art scene, and you'll find many galleries in Broken Hill and the surrounding towns to whet your artistic appetite.

Broken Hill: AThriving Regional Art Capital

It is said that Broken Hill may have more artists per head of population than anywhere else in the nation! You can find some fantastic examples of the town's creativity at the Broken Hill Regional Art Gallery, which boasts an excellent collection of almost 2000 colonial, modern and contemporary Australian artworks.

The Pro Hart Gallery is home to an excellent selection of paintings by Pro Hart, considered the founder of the Outback painting movement. You'll also find hundreds of works from other well-known Australian artists. The gallery was designed by Hart himself, and in true artistic fashion, the art has been arranged in an unconventional manner around the gallery.

A little further out of town, you'll find an incredible, unmissable sight: the Broken Hill Sculpture and Living Desert Sanctuary. 12 sandstone sculptures from international artists adorn the desert. Come at sunset to enjoy this picturesque sight in all its Instagrammable glory.

Silverton: John Dynon Gallery

The tiny almost-ghost town of Silverton boasts several art galleries, including the incredible John Dynon Gallery. One of Australia's top selling artists, Dynon paints stunning vistas of Outback landscapes, as well as animals – his emus are absolutely gorgeous!

Wilcannia: Eddy Harris Aboriginal Artist

Eddy is an internationally renowned artist and a local Wilcannia Man. Part of the Bakandji (which means river people) tribe Eddy draws on the land and its history for inspiration to create his works and has built an amazing catalogue of painting, carvings, engravings didgeridoos and boomerangs. Eddy is based at Warrawong on the Darling, with a studio and gallery located on-site.
